Almost 20 years ago, a member of the church had a vision and gathered a handful of others from the church who enthusiastically joined her to plan, design and build a "columbarium." While it is an old term and an old tradition used for centuries in the world, many people ad-

mitted they had never even heard that word before! Architect, Mike Bier, offered his services to design the columbarium and garden, the Methodist Church provided the site, and other community members joined the initial foursome and worked tirelessly to make the garden a reality. And now the Matecumbe Memorial Garden provides a quiet spot for family and friends to visit to reflect and treasure beautiful memories.

Located on the grounds of the Matecumbe United Methodist Church, adjacent to the Historic Hurricane Monument, the columbarium is non-denominational, a place for the entire community.

Columbarium Story, forever securing memories, continued



As we walk through the garden, the lives of those who have meant so much to Islamorada are remembered. Some just regular folks, having an exceptional impact on our lives and history!



Dave Roberts was a much loved volunteer firefighter and Assistant Fire Chief for Islamorada. He helped form a search and rescue dog team in Islamorada. Dave was a man of so many talents—he also worked in the IT department for the Village—best known as the man who recorded Council meetings a dozen years ago. For Dave, a most patriotic man, a highlight of his career was serving on the 9/11 Honor Guard for Fallen Firefighters at Ground Zero in Manhattan. When Dave died in 2011 the Islamorada Fire Department placed a plaque for Dave on the wall of the Matecumbe Memorial Garden, “within visual distance of Fire Station 20.” The entire fire department loved this special man and wanted to be certain Dave will always be remembered as a part of Islamorada’s history.



Ralph Harding died recently. His remains will be placed in the Memorial Garden. Ralph was such a well known and loved resident of Islamorada. Old timers will always remember “Rotten Ralphs” at Whale Harbor. You can read about his life with Faye at www.matecumbeumc.org/our-people1. Frank and Emily Vecella were part of the Islamorada community for many years. In a tragic diving accident off the island of Yap in Micronesia, son David, died in 2008. They placed a bench in the garden in his memory. Frank died in 2016 and Emily in 2022. Special memories of them will be revived with visits to the garden, remembered for their kindness and decades of contributions to our community and the Matecumbe United Methodist Church.

The History of the Children's Home

In 1908 The Florida United Methodist Children's Home was established in Enterprise, Florida as the Florida Methodist Orphanage. It began with the purchase of one building, eight town lots and a tract of forty acres of land purchased from Miss Emma Tucker for \$1,250 dollars. Articles of Incorporation were filed with the State of Florida on June 3, 1908.

Many important milestones of the 20th century are noted in the records of the Children's Home. During the Great Depression of the 1930's the Children's Home grew much of its own food, tended dairy cattle and raised a variety of animals. As many as 100 former residents of the Children's Home served in uniform in World War II.

During the 1940's and 50's the philosophy of child care began to change. Children needed much more than three meals a day, a safe place to sleep and basic care. The emotional and psychological needs of the children required a higher level of clinical care and attention. In 1955 the first two cottages were built. Before this time, the boys and girls lived in dormitory style buildings. There are now 14 individual homes that provide a family like atmosphere for each child. Every cottage is under the care and supervision of dedicated house parents and a trained therapist.

The Children's Home continued to expand during the 70's and 80's. A gymnasium was built in 1976 followed by a campus chapel in 1979. The Day Care Center began serving the community in 1982. The therapeutic ropes course was added in 1989.

A tremendous period of growth began in 1998 with the addition of the Bruton Counseling Center, Waller-Jeter Cottage, the completion of the Worrell Education Center, and the renovation of Hardin Hall, the largest building on campus.

The Florida United Methodist Children's Home is now a diverse ministry that includes residential care, therapeutic group care, foster care, emergency shelter care, independent living assistance, and community child care center.

On October 9, Elisabeth Gadd, Chief Development Officer of the Children's home presented our church with an award for being a "Top 20% Per Capita Giving Church" for 2021.... \$10,727.50—a significant donation considering our size. But I bet we can do even better. Last Sunday (Fifth Sunday) we donated a little more than \$900 to the Children's Home.

Christmas Gifts—now it is time to assure the children get gift cards for Christmas!

Please consider donating a gift card in increments of \$20 to \$100. Especially useful are gift cards for Amazon, Visa, TJ Maxx, Walmart, or restaurant cards so the staff can treat children to meals throughout the year—Papa John's Pizza, Applebee's, Taco Bell, McDonald's and Chili's.
